## **Milton Fire and Rescue**

New Fire Station Proposed

Early last summer a fire station/emergency operations center (EOC) committee was formed which included concerned citizens, selectman, budget committee member and members of the fire department. The committee reviewed the fire department's current and future needs with respect to providing adequate emergency response, the town's current fire apparatus, and the membership of the department.

Last year's warrant article approved \$30,000 to proceed with the preliminary planning for a new fire station that would meet the needs of the town for the next 50 years. In some respects, this is a perfect time for such a project; municipal bonds have hit a long-time low rate, currently just below 3%, local contractors are eager for work and the former site of the Moose Lodge has been conditionally donated as a site. Material costs are beginning to rise, so building as soon a possible will ultimately save the town a great deal of money.

The committee identified specific needs of the department such as: storage of apparatus, space for department trainings, much needed fire department office space, medical office space, a dispatch area, decontamination area to wash gear and therefore extend its life, firefighting clothing storage, bathrooms, tool and maintenance spaces, storage for hose and the air compressor, among many other needs. Site issues included power, water (the Milton Water Department's pressure is inadequate for station needs), road access, and sewer. Many nights were spent discussing the traffic patterns of citizens, emergency responders' private vehicles and emergency vehicles

Eventually the list was complete and a design team was selected. They were given Milton's list of "needs" and "wants". Their goal was to produce a preliminary design for a station that will serve the town for scores of years.

When the initial plan and cost estimate was brought before the committee, it was clear it would have to be downsized in order to be made more affordable. Required site work proved to be considerably more expensive than had been foreseen. In addition, inadequate town water pressure added greatly to base expense. Discussion centered on reducing office sizes and floor plans; however this was already at a minimum. Numerous discussions were held on how to park the trucks to reduce the floor plan while still allowing the trucks to respond to calls without pulling one truck out to access the truck behind it. For example, you should not have to move an engine to get the ambulance out to go on a medical call, nor do you want to move the ambulance to get an engine out on a fire call. Since calls can come in at anytime and in any order, it is important to have the trucks stacked in the building in the order in which they will most likely respond. Another option was to put doors on both sides of the building and have a "drive through" option. This would remove the need for "stacking" the trucks.

In the end, it came down to finances. The cost of paving the rear of the building and the rear overhead doors was substituted with a plan to park trucks two deep. Trying to save dollars here and there separated the "what would be nice to have" as opposed to the "what is necessary to have". The plan will be to stack the trucks two deep, with the first response vehicles parked in front of second response apparatus, thus meeting both the needs of responding to emergencies and finances.

New construction comes with certain code requirements including: making the station fully American Disability Act compliant, a sprinkler system, and a holding tank for water run off from truck washing. Then there are the functional needs that include a concrete floor with appropriate drainage, water resistant walls so trucks can be washed as needed and the necessary square footage to accommodate the size of apparatus and membership.

Additional budget savings include leaving some administrative area space unfinished, and unfurnished, but ready for future completion. This includes future bunk rooms, showers and a kitchen area. The unfinished space is much cheaper to build now than to add later. Therefore, some of the future space of office and bunk rooms will not be ready for 2014's occupation. The proposal will however, allow for the future when 24/7 coverage is required by the town.

The final budget estimate is \$2.69 million. Although this number seems large, the economics are favorable due to the currently very low cost of bonding. According to the NH Municipal Bond Bank, the estimated impact on the tax rate is 63 cents per \$1000 for a 20 year bond. For a property that is valued at \$150,000; property tax bill will increase by only \$47.25, and this number decreases over the 20 year life of the bond. Because the bond will be paid over twenty years, people living in town today will share the cost of the fire station with those who move into town for the next twenty years.

The building committee has spent many hours balancing needs vs. wants and balancing public safety and financial responsibility with financial strain. There is no one who will tell you the cost of the station is small, yet the need is great:

- The department continues to lack a space for training. Twice each month members gather at various locations around town to hold their training sessions.
- Apparatus has to be custom built (\$\$\$) to fit into the current sta-
- The town's aerial ladder truck is housed in Milton Mills, eight miles from its greatest need and the majority of incidents and responders.
- The town does not own or have space for a tanker truck needed to supply a large volume of water, and the town of Milton has many residences which have no water supply with which to fight a fire.
- Office and storage space is inadequate to write and store reports and coordinate the operations of the forty member volunteer department.
- The station is currently staffed ten hours each day, seven days each week. With plans to expand to twelve hour shifts.

Members of the committee hope you will consider all the information and ask any questions you may still have. A presentation is scheduled for Wednesday February 6<sup>th</sup> at 6:30 PM. It will be located at Central Station, 460 White Mountain Highway. The evening will include a brief presentation, a question and answer period and finish up with a tour of the station for anyone interested.

The same evening will be firefighter training so this will provide an opportunity for the public to see how training is currently taking place.

In addition to the Informational Session, an open house is scheduled for the morning of the deliberative session starting at 9:00 AM.

One last announcement, PLEASE be careful when enjoying this ice season. We have been having a variety of temperatures and when water freezes, thaws and then freezes again, it is not always as strong as you may think. Black or clear ice is stronger than white ice. It contains less air pockets and is more solid. Yet, no ice is considered completely safe so always practice common sense and BE CAREFUL.

### The Value of Conservation

My name is Cynthia Wyatt and I have served on Milton's Conservation Commission for the last 15 years. Milton's Select Board has submitted a warrant article to discontinue funding Milton's Conservation Fund with 50% of revenues collected from land use change tax penalties (LUCT). Milton approved this funding by town vote in 2002 pursuant to RSA 79-A. LUCT is the only source of funding for Milton's Conservation Fund.

LUCT is a penalty (10% of fair market value) paid to the town by landowners who choose to take their property out of current use for development. LUCT money from development is funneled back into future conservation projects. LUCT is not Milton taxpayers' money. Most of Milton's neighboring towns contribute all or part of LUCT to their Conservation Funds.

Over the years, New Hampshire's Legislature has enacted important legislation such as RSA 79-A to support local conservation efforts because it is in the public interest to do so.

The preservation of important natural resource areas is not only vital for the protection of our air, water, scenic and recreational areas, but also for our local economy. Conservation lands impose few if any costs on local government. Additionally, conservation lands support and promote the Tourism and Forest Products Industries in NH, which are significant income and job producers to Milton and all NH communities.

Milton's visual, economic, and recreational centerpieces are the Milton Three Ponds. The Milton Conservation Commission has worked hard over the years to develop policies and practices in the Natural Resources chapter of Milton's Master Plan to ensure Milton's water quality for the health and welfare of its citizens as well as the economic health of its communities. One of the most effective ways to do so is by providing funding for voluntary conservation easement projects that permanently conserve private forest lands. Forest lands provide critical filtering buffers for Milton's ground and surface waters. Funding for conservation easements and their associated high costs typically require quick action due to purchase and sales deadlines. In order to assist and expedite important conservation projects, the State passed enabling legislation to allow towns to establish conservation funds and to transfer LUCT to those funds.

In Milton, many conservation easements on private lands such as the 370 acre Salmon Falls Headwater lands in Milton Mills have been facilitated with help from Milton's Conservation Fund. These conservation projects fulfill the conservation objectives of Milton's Master plan by protecting Milton's water resources, forestlands, wildlife habitat, farmland, and recreational areas. The preservation of Milton's scenic beauty and rural character and the protection of the Salmon Falls Watershed and Milton's public drinking supply also provide profound, long lasting benefits for Milton's economy. In every aspect, the preservation of Milton's important natural resources is in the public interest of Milton's communities.

### • Construction Information

Each creation/cake entry must be created on a base no larger than 3ft by 2ft long. Smaller is fine. Please make base suitable for size of the cake. There is a 6 inch maximum border allowance around the creation. The majority of the display should be edible and the entry will be judged on the edibility of the creation. No artificial display lighting will be allowed on the entry.

### Who Can Enter

The competition is open to everyone who wishes to participate with a completed entry form. The entries will be judged in three categories (1) Best Children's Entry (12 yrs. & younger– entry must be completed entirely by the child) (2) Best Family Entry & (3) Best In Show. Each cake must be registered in either children/family entry group. Best In Show will be chosen from one of the groups.

### How will They Be Judged?

The criteria for judging will include 1.) Structural design (how well does your display stay together) 2.) Creative use of materials. 3.) Detailing (how detailed is the overall entry). 4.) Overall excellence.

### Who will Judge?

The entries will be judged by members of the Milton Winter Carnival Committee and the Recreation Director. All decisions of the group are final. Judging will take place at the Emma Ramsey Community Center @ 3:00 pm on Saturday, February 16th.

#### Prizes

There will be trophies & gift certificates for first place in each above categories.

### When & Where Entries Should Be Dropped Off

All entries should be dropped off at the Emma Ramsey Community Center beginning Friday: 2/15/13 (10:00 am - 4:00 pm) - Saturday 2/16/13 from (8:00 - 12:00 noon). No entries will be allowed after noontime the day of carnival. Entries can be picked up anytime after 3:00 pm on 2/16/13.
